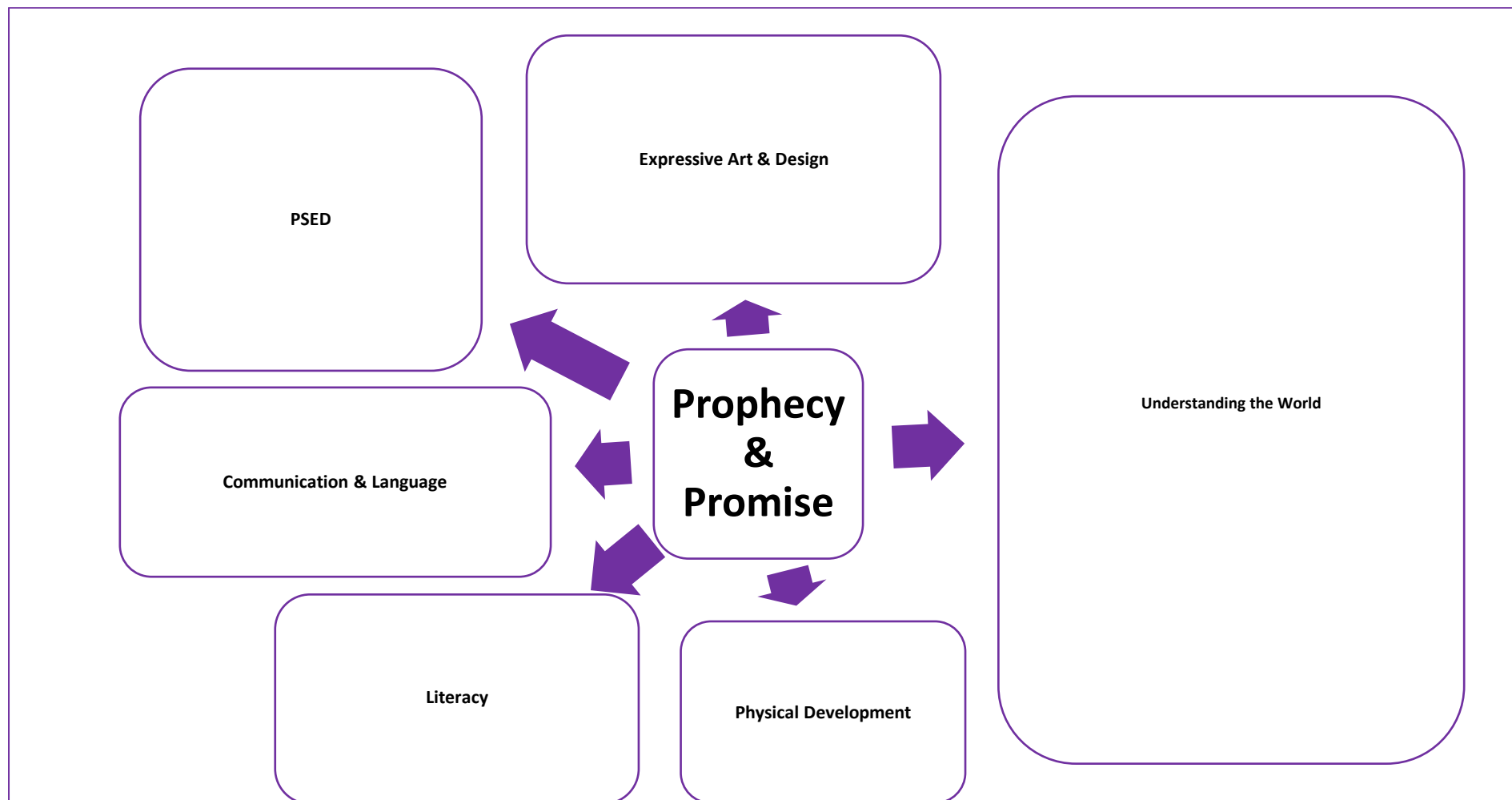

EYFS Reception Prophecy & Promise

Overview Prophecy and promise: ‘In many and various ways, God spoke to our ancestors by the prophets’ (Heb 1:1). In the Old Testament the prophets speak of God reaching to his people, calling them back into a relationship with him. In this branch, pupils will explore the Christian understanding of the teaching of the prophets as they point to the fulfilment of God’s promise in a messiah, Jesus Christ. They will explore the expectant waiting for the Messiah through the Advent season and how this speaks to Christians today as they wait for Christ. Pupils will encounter the story of the nativity of Jesus and the mystery of the incarnation. (when God became man)	Introduction *Prior Learning – Reminder - <i>The Bible tells us all about God. We have to keep this in a very special place (prayer space/focus, place the book with the title Bible and the ‘Word’ of God) Can you remember where our special book is? Who can remember what the book is called? Remember this book tells us all about God. Would you like to hear a special story about God today?</i> - Please remember to use a Good News Bible – whilst this is not an accessible read for children, they need to experience what a Bible looks like, and how it is used – just as in other religions in Christianity this is a sacred book and needs to be treated with the utmost respect and care. - Children will see how you as an adult use the Bible – they may not understand the words but it is our job then to retell the story in as many ways as possible – through retelling, crafts, art, dance etc... etc... This may be the very first-time children will have heard the story about Mary and Jesus. And possibly their first nativity in a school setting. **Please note that some of the introductions and activities are from the Nursery scheme of work – this is to accommodate schools that do not have a Nursery setting. Please adapt as necessary to suit the needs of your children. It may be useful for teachers to plan Nursery and Reception together so that progression can be identified. However, children at this age often need some repetition.	General Guidance - Please begin with Hear for each sequence. - The sequences themselves as a whole may be best suited in a different order especially considering the age and stage of the children. - Also, there may be times when you may wish to teach Believe, Celebrate and Live in a different order following Hear or together to suit the needs of the children. The activities within the sequences are suggested and you do not need to cover them all! Just ensure you are covering 10% of your curriculum time each week for Religious Education.
Prophecy and Promise Theme for Reception: The focus of this branch is for pupils to develop an understanding of God’s love Creation and Covenant – God shows his love by making a wonderful world for us all to live in. God wants us to look after the world and one another. Prophecy and Promise – God shows his love by sending his son, Jesus to live with us. Jesus is born to show us how to love everyone.

Teacher notes

Please see the adapted reading above – T this age the children won't need to hear about the descendants of Jacob – this learning will happen in later years.

****Retelling the story**

Please be very careful when choosing any other resources from for e.g. from YouTube cartoons as the images and words may lead children to think of the story as magic! The story is known as a 'mystery' to Catholics and should be told as it is in the Bible.

Learning Activities

- Introducing Mary to the children.

"We are going to hear a story from the Bible about a very special lady called Mary. Mary was very good when she was a little girl. She always did as she was told and was kind and loving to everyone. When she grew up she was going to get married to a man named Joseph. "

Reenact this with play figures and introduce Mary and Joseph – display them on the prayer table/focus so children start to identify them. Explore how they always try to be good for their mums or people who look after them.

See work from Christ the King evidence – thank you Lorna. Please find in Evidence folder on the SharePoint

- Hear the story from the Bible – Luke (as adapted) directly from the Bible.
- Retell the story of Mary's baby in your own words using the Golden Box – please consider the advice on resources above in the teacher's notes. We would advise keeping the story simple and using peg dolls from the Golden Box. Or/And ...Retell using images from God's Story

- **Writing** – Mary was going to have a baby.

Teacher Notes

- **Mary was chosen by God to give birth to his son.**

Mary's lineage directly traced back through David, Judah, and Jacob ([Luke 3:23-38](#)). The Savior had to be born in the right lineage, to which Mary perfectly fit the requirements. There were multiple prophecies in the Old Testament concerning the Savior, which specifically recorded that the Lord would be born of David's lineage. The prophet Isaiah wrote, "A shoot will come up from the stump of Jesse; from his roots a Branch will bear fruit" ([Isaiah 11:1](#)).

Mary was chosen because of her obedience. Mary was a young virgin woman when she was carrying Jesus because it was a divine pregnancy and birth. Since Jesus was born of a virgin, He was not born with a sinful nature. The Lord chose Mary because of her obedience to Him and her willing heart.

In Reception, it is enough for the children to understand that Mary was a good person who loved God.

Suggested Resources

Learning Activities

- **Wonder – why was Mary chosen by God?** Retell the version of the story again through images and art. Please note that some of the images have been cropped as the focus is on Mary alone.

Talk about the three images

- What is Mary doing? Why?
- How old do you think Mary is?
- Describe the things in her house
- What is she wearing?
- Do you think she was very rich?
- Did she live in a big house?

Using a simple image of Mary from God's Story or other suitable one ask the children to find words that describe Mary and her house or scribe for the children.

Tidying up, cleaning, sewing, busy, no shoes, pots, pans, wooden door etc...

Lead children to understanding that Mary was very good, she always did her jobs and chose to look after the house and make clothes and cook. She loved God very much. That is why God chose her.

- Make the links between mums/dads/carers/nans etc .. family love & Mary as a mum.
- Remind children of all of the wonderful things that God has given to us – explored in Creation and Covenant – share some work as a reminder. God didn't stop there, he sent his Son Jesus. God loves everyone, Jesus loves everyone. That is why it is so important that we get ready for Jesus.

CELEBRATE

Teachers Notes

- **Advent traditions**

Advent starts on the fourth Sunday before Christmas Day. It marks the start of the Church's liturgical year. Advent comes from the Latin *adventus*, meaning 'arrival' or 'coming'. It's a key time in which we prepare ourselves to celebrate the Lord coming into the world as the incarnate God of love. The liturgical vestments priests wear during the season are purple, matching the candles lit on the Advent Wreath each Sunday of Advent. Purple is a colour typically associated with penance. The exception is the third Sunday – Gaudete Sunday – when priests wear pink vestments – the colour of rejoicing. Advent has a two-fold character: for it is a time of preparation for the Solemnities of Christmas, in which the First Coming of the Son of God to humanity is remembered; and likewise when, by remembrance of this, minds and hearts are led to look forward to Christ's Second Coming at the end of time. For these two reasons, Advent is a period for devout and expectant delight.

Younger children need to build foundations of learning about Advent by making promises. You may find that making a different promise every day as you open an Advent Calendar might be too overwhelming. A suggestion is to have one promise per week – this way they will be building on the idea of the four candles on the Advent Wreath.

Please Note

***The Nursery activity is built around using a large crib – for class prayer and worship and end-of-topic reflection, the * Reception activity is an individual small crib which can then be used for individual prayer and shared at home – this will progress prayer and understanding that Jesus' love is for everyone and as a personal response. If you do not have a Nursery setting please choose either a larger class crib or individual – or maybe both!**

Preparing the manger/crib

is the practice of preparing a soft bedding in the manger for Jesus by using little wisps of straw as tokens of prayers and good works through the season of Advent. This is originally a French custom that quickly spread to other countries. Every night the child is allowed to put in the crib one straw for each act of devotion, good work or sacrifice performed. "Thus the Christ Child, coming on Christmas Day, finds an ample supply of tender straw to keep Him warm and to soften the hardness of the manger's boards" (Francis Weiser, Handbook of Christian Feasts and Customs, 1958).

Learning Activities

Introduce a suitable Advent Calendar to the children – many will have one at home, however, please share one that is Christian for the purposes of Religious Education. Counting down of days can be combined with promises. Link the promises to **preparing the crib** – see below and this can also be linked to the class Collective Worship.

Waiting for Jesus is hard, it can take a long time. Each week we can try to remember to work hard or listen, share, say how we are feeling, love ...Let's make some heart promises... you may wish to combine this with the heart crafts for the tree – see above.

- ***I love to work hard or listen*** (while we are waiting hopefully - Hope)
- ***I love to share*** (while we are peacefully waiting - Peace)
- ***I love to be joyful - Say how we are feeling*** (while we are trying to wait joyfully - Joy)
- ***I love my family and friends.*** (while we are waiting lovingly - Love)

****Ongoing activity for adding to the crib each day for the promises we have made in Advent**

Preparing the Crib

- This tradition symbolises each person's effort to prepare a **special place in their hearts** for the baby Jesus.
- Share the story about collecting straw in preparation for Jesus coming at Christmas. **The Last Straw.** *You may wish to retell the story that you can hear on you tube – using the Golden Box - the link is in resources- as there are no pictures. The book can only be bought from US however, if I can get a copy I will upload it onto SharePoint.*
- Give each child an empty manger. A small cardboard box covered with bright paper will do as well.
- At a particular time each day, the children take a small piece of cloth/string/straw in exchange for promises made in Advent – they place the string etc over Advent in the small crib to prepare a soft bed for Jesus. You may wish to extend this activity and send home a small crib for the children to prepare with their families too.
- Small peg dolls can be decorated or covered with material to make a baby Jesus. This is then placed in the crib nearer to the end of term or on Christmas day at home.

OR you could surprise the children and place Jesus in each child's crib and celebrate his birth.

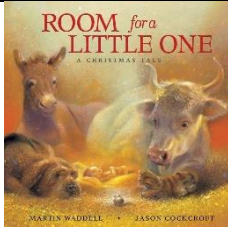

- **if you are choosing to do this** *Talk about the stable – where animals were kept such as sheep or donkeys and how the animals would have eaten from the manger which we now know as a crib. – .*
- Reenact this with themselves and with play figures Mary, Joseph and Jesus – display them on the prayer table/focus so children start to identify them. Explore links to their own family.
- Remind children of their love they have been sharing and promises made through Advent – link to the love the Holy Family had – read Nativity Story with the children and focus on the love
- **Story of Jesus Birth** – see link read up to 1:20 and continue after the next bible story
- **Writing** – Jesus was asleep in a crib/ Jesus was born in a stable. Etc...

CELEBRATE & LIVE

Teacher Notes:

- The focus on celebrating and living has been brought together to give children a holistic approach of understanding the story.
- **CELEBRATE** The tradition of the crib
- **LIVE** *Ongoing* Advent Promises

CELEBRATE & LIVE - Advent, it is a time to get ready for Christmas. When the child Jesus was born, his mother Mary laid him in a manger. The manger became his crib. The word “manger” comes from the Latin word manducare which means “to eat.” A manger or crib is a wooden or stone-feeding trough or food box that holds hay for larger farm animals like cattle, horses, and donkeys. Mangers were located wherever livestock were kept, places like stables or caves.

When Mary and Joseph arrived in Bethlehem there was no room for them at the inn, so they were forced to find lodging elsewhere, probably in a cave where animals were staying. When Jesus was born, Mary would not have wanted to lay her infant on the hard, cold, stone floor. Instead, she had to make do with what was available and the manger proved to be a convenient alternative: the hay was soft, the box was up and off the ground, and the sides tall enough to keep her child safely inside.

Jesus was not laid in a manger by accident. It is a major spiritual symbol. Animals go to the manger for physical food, but with Jesus lying on the hay, we can go to the manger for spiritual food. Jesus has an infinite storehouse of nourishment available, and we can approach him any time and never go hungry. Jesus feeds us with his love.

- **Celebrating the tradition of the crib.** Make **Holy Family** plates, cards, stick puppets – retell the story so far as they make their items. Recognise who each person is and what they have been doing leading up to this point in the story. Recognise the importance of the crib. What are they wondering about the baby that is inside? What do they think he will grow up like? Talk about this family in comparison to their own. Why do they think this family story is special?

The Shepherds and the Angels

⁸There were some shepherds in that part of the country who were spending the night in the fields, taking care of their flocks. ⁹An angel of the Lord appeared to them, and the glory of the Lord shone over them. They were terribly afraid, ¹⁰but the angel said to them, “Don't be afraid! I am here with good news for you, which will bring great joy to all the people. ¹¹This very day in David's town your Savior was born—Christ the Lord! ¹²And this is what will prove it to you: you will find a baby wrapped in cloths and lying in a manger.”

¹³ Suddenly a great army of heaven's angels appeared with the angel, singing praises to God:

¹⁴ "Glory to God in the highest heaven,
and peace on earth to those with whom he is pleased!"

¹⁵ When the angels went away from them back into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, "Let's go to Bethlehem and see this thing that has happened, which the Lord has told us."

¹⁶ So they hurried off and found Mary and Joseph and saw the baby lying in the manger. ¹⁷ When the shepherds saw him, they told them what the angel had said about the child. ¹⁸ All who heard it were amazed at what the shepherds said. ¹⁹ Mary remembered all these things and thought deeply about them. ²⁰ The shepherds went back, singing praises to God for all they had heard and seen; it had been just as the angel had told them.

HEAR

Teacher notes

Jesus' birth was not announced to rich men, but at first to poor shepherds. This is to tell us that Jesus comes to love the poor. Later on in the story He comes for rich – He comes then for everyone.

No wonder the shepherds were "filled with great fear"! The brightness of the Lord's "glory" that broke through the darkness of that night terrified them. The word "glory" means the weight or significance or excellence of something or someone that generates a response of awe and wonder. The shepherds' response to this was "great fear." The angel did not come to instill fear but to announce "good news of great joy for all people." The angelic sermon was one of "good news." Good news is characterised by "great joy," therefore they need not "fear". And it was declared to "all people," specifically "to you," the shepherds, who represent "all people." The shepherds represent us.

The good news is that "unto you is born this day...a Saviour." It's a present reality not a future hope.
"Unto you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour who is Christ, the Lord."

Their search was for a stable, where they would find the Baby. This is a most unusual sign isn't it? A baby in a feeding trough?

The choir sang: "Glory to God in the highest." The heavens rejoice and praise God for salvation's plan, that there is a remedy for sin, that there is "peace on earth among those with whom he is pleased." That was the meaning of Christmas to the angels. They sang not only of the One who was born but of the grace that had come.

The shepherds acted in faith. They gave no thought to who would watch over the sheep. For a shepherd to leave his sheep, especially at night, was unthinkable, irresponsible. All their livelihood may be wiped out by this single act. But nothing would stop them in their desire to find the Messiah. Nothing would stop them from acting in obedience and faith. ¹⁶ "And they went with haste and found Mary and Joseph, and the baby lying in a manger." They searched for a baby and found the whole family. What they saw was exactly what the angel had promised - a baby lying in a feeding trough. Their faith was honoured. The angels' testimony was true.

In Advent and through their lives, Christians must find Him too.

To find Christ is to have peace with God: To find Christ is to be well pleasing to God. God has declared: "This is my beloved Son in whom I am well-pleased." When we find and delight in Jesus Christ, we are pleasing to God.

Christian duty is to worship Him, so that the song "Glory to God" culminates with adoration.

Teacher notes

Religious education lessons are not the sum of pupils' experience in learning about the birth of Jesus in a Catholic primary school. Pupils will experience Advent traditions, participate in nativity plays, see the Christmas crib, and learn Christmas carols with the secular traditions that run alongside the Christmas season. However, in religious education, teachers should focus curriculum time on learning about the revelation of God in Jesus. (this is included throughout this planning)

For Christians, God's act of emptying himself into our humanity in the incarnation is the foundation of Christian faith and hope for our salvation. While younger children will not yet understand this theologically, they can appreciate it narratively, so the focus is on knowing the story of how Jesus was born. Knowing this will help them connect with the Christmas celebrations in their local community and the Nativity story, whether they share the Christian faith or not. *RED Page 82*

Therefore, part of the Celebrate area of learning for the children is directly linked to how Jesus' birth will be celebrated in school. Children may be taking part in a service/play etc... and this should be embraced as retelling the story of Jesus' birth as part of their overall understanding of God's love at this time of year in the form of a **Nativity Celebration**.
